At the time of writing, the Harmer Hill end is up for sale. This leads us to think about the paths through the woodland which are well used by the community although some are Permissive and not public rights of way. If access to the permissive paths was to be denied in the future by a new owner for whatever reason, this would be a great loss. Even a change of use could bring its own problems. We all enjoy the glorious spectacle of the rhododendrons in flower in May and June and what a shame it would be if we were not able to see them other than from the roadsides.

The track known as Keeper's Lane leading from the end of Newton lane down to the Lower Road is a public right of way. Historically the Newton end was known as The Setts, where coffin bearers or pallbearers heading from Newton would "set" the bier down for a rest and some light refreshment before they trudged on all the way to Myddle churchyard. Now don't quote me on this, because I am sure I have read it somewhere but don't know where I got the information from! If anyone knows better, please let the editor know!

I was puzzled at the origin of the word "pallbearer" and Google has kindly given me the answer: Roman soldiers wore a cape or cloak called the pallium. In medieval times the term pallium was shorted to pall, and Christians would use a pall to cover their loved ones when burying them.

From The Rectory

Dear Friends,

June this year signals a change in colour. Our church hangings and vestments go green as the long Trinity season begins, a season which lasts right through to November. This green season is also known as Ordinary Time to distinguish it from the festivals and high days and holy days of the church calendar. And after all the celebrations of recent times, in the Church and in our nation, it's good to be ordinary again. Except that nothing in the Christian life really is ordinary, which is where four special people come in – ordinary people who became anything but.

We start on 11th June as we celebrate and commemorate St Barnabas whom we read about in Acts. Barnabas became a member of the early Christian community in Jerusalem and soon became a leader in the Church. Barnabas introduced Paul to the apostles in Jerusalem. Because of persecution Barnabas moved to Antioch and worked with Paul in their mission to the Gentiles. According to Acts, Paul and Barnabas worked together on a mission tour to Cyprus and appeared together at a defining conference in Jerusalem of the apostles and church elders gathered to discuss whether Gentiles needed to be circumcised in order to be able to become followers of the Way. The account given by Paul and Barnabas of their work bringing Gentiles to a knowledge of Christ contributed to the conference decision that this requirement should not be imposed on Gentiles. Barnabas and Paul then sadly fell out and separated over the guestion of allowing John Mark. Barnabas' cousin, to accompany them on another missionary tour. Acts speaks of Barnabas as "a good man, full of the Holv Spirit and of faith."

Jumping ahead in the calendar brings us to 29th June when we remember Saints Peter and Paul and their extraordinary work for the new Church. Peter was chosen by Jesus to be the rock on which his Church was to be founded and, as we read above, Paul became the great missionary to the Gentiles. Peter was the Galilean fisherman, Paul, an educated Jew and a Roman citizen. Two very different men without whom the Church would not have come into being. Not surprising therefore that Petertide is when Ordination to the diaconate and priesthood takes place when people today are consecrated to continue the work of the Church started by Peter and Paul.

So in this "ordinary" time may we be encouraged by the saints we celebrate, ordinary people who responded to God's call to them. However ordinary we may feel ourselves to be, God has a job for each one of us. May we by God's grace discern what that is and play our part in building up his Church following the example and in the footsteps of his saints who have gone before.

PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

Recently, my wife and I had cause to visit the Accident and Emergency department of the local hospital. Waiting for treatment we were sent to a windowless and fairly airless room that had been designated for people who were thought to be "Fit to Sit". There was nothing to do but just sit and wait. As might be expected, other people in the room began talking to each other and as also might be expected those with outgoing personalities led the way. One woman, who nobody there had met before talked and talked to the people around her in a very loud voice, sharing all about many her health problems whether they were interested or not.

Don't let anyone tell you that the English are not polite people. We were there from nine-thirty p.m. until almost three a.m. and this lady didn't stop or hold back. Everyone was tired and stressed and in need of medical attention but no one told her to shut up even though I'm sure they felt like doing so. In that room the talkative lady made no friends. What she had to share was not appropriate, encouraging or in any way "Good News". It made me think about conversations that I have had in similar situations, and led me to ask myself the question, "What do I actually share with people when I engage in conversation?"

As a new Christian at the age of thirty I remember being encouraged to share my testimony whenever I could. That was part and parcel of being a disciple of Jesus I was told. My testimony should involve sharing how I became a Christian and what knowing Jesus means to me in a simple and matter-of -fact way, rather than regaling people with a list of my troubles or illnesses. As doing this became easier with time, it could be expanded by what was referred to as "Gossiping the Gospel" or talking about Jesus' purpose and ministry. Along with sharing personal examples of how following Jesus changed my life for the better, this was the "Good News" I was encouraged to talk about.

The years have rolled by and that first flush of Christian enthusiasm seems to have faded with them but thanks to that talkative woman at the hospital I have been reminded that I, along with every other Christian, do have Good News to share and that as disciples of Jesus we should all attempt to do that when God presents us with the appropriate opportunities, as I know He always will.

Parish Council News

Two Council meetings were held in Harmer Village Hall on Wednesday 8th. May. The first was the Annual Parish Meeting which was open to the general public giving an opportunity to meet the local Councillors and discuss issues related to the Parish.

Unfortunately, only two residents took the opportunity and the meeting went ahead beginning with an update on the items raised last year, a full report from the Council Chairman and information from two of the PCSOs from Wem Police.

Outlining the items raised last year it was reported that:

(a) No progress had been made with the proposal to build a small estate of affordable properties on land adjacent to Godings Lane in Harmer Hill. The Council had agreed to relinquish the lease but the land had not yet been purchased by Shropshire Council.

(b) Neither the police nor Shropshire Council supported a request to reduce the speed limit on Wem Road to 30mph without additional calming measures, which currently Shropshire Council were not able to finance.

(c) The request for an additional street light and an extension of the 40mph speed limit in Shotton Lane had been investigated and the new streetlight contractors had stated that there was no network to connect additional lights to and there were too many trees in the area to consider installing solar lights. There were no objections from the police or Shropshire Council to the extension of the 40mph if and when finance could be made available.

(d) The request for a dog waste bin close to Harmer Hill Village Hall resulted in a new bin being purchased by the Parish Council and put in place and this was being emptied regularly.

Chairman's Report::

The Chairman gave an interesting and informative report, highlighting the range of activities undertaken by the Council in the past year, in an effort to meet the needs of the community. These included road safety measures, litter and dog fouling control, maintenance of the two play areas and the many footpaths which are well used by residents.

By careful budgeting and the monitoring of expenditure, it had not been necessary to seek an increase in the precept, which meant that the local element of the Council Tax had not increased. However, he was pleased to report that the Council had still been able to make grants towards the upkeep of the Village Halls and Church Grounds as well as supporting the publication of the Messenger and the development of the Youth Centre. Small grants had also been given to three local charities. He wished to extend thanks to all the Members, the Parish Clerk and Shropshire Councillor Brian Williams for their dedicated support throughout the year. A full copy of the report was made available to all those attending and one can be found on the Council's web site.

Police Report.

CSO Liz Walmsley and PCSO Olly Morris were in attendance and stated that they had been made aware of concerns raised by the Council with the major one being road safety and speeding traffic. They were engaged in carrying out roadside speed checks and would respond to identified locations. Although the Parish has a low crime record it was essential for the public to be vigilant and report concerns to the police on 101 or direct to the Wem team. The plan is to make the public aware of their presence and they were happy to attend organised events. No further issues were raised.

The second meeting was the Council's AGM when the first item was news that Miss Karyn Row had resigned from the Council because of her study commitments. Thanks were expressed for the work she had undertaken for the Council and it was confirmed that an attempt would be made to appoint a replacement Councillor for the Harmer Hill Ward. Members then moved on to elect Officers and appoint representatives for the next year. Councillor Colin Ruck was elected as Chairman and Councillor Marshall Andrew as Vice Chairman, both on a unanimous vote. Details of all the other appointments can be found in the minutes of the meeting.

Other issues considered were:

(a) Affordable Housing:

There was concern about the lack of further information about the proposal to develop the small affordable housing estate adjacent to Godings Lane and the Clerk was asked to make contact with the legal department at Shropshire Council to discuss developments.

(b) Entrance Signs for both Villages:

In the absence of Councillor A. Harris who was dealing with the proposed project and had been unable to attend the meeting because of a family illness, it was decided to defer any discussion until the next meeting.

(c) Myddle Church Clock:

Councillor G. Miller reported that he had contacted three companies and to date had received two quotations for carrying out the upgrade but understood that the third one was in the process of being prepared. Once all thee had been received and considered by a representative of the Diocese he would bring the figures to the Council for consideration.

(d) Audit:

Members considered and approved the Annual Governance Statement which was signed by the Chairman and the Clerk. A range of other draft audit documents were issued for consideration before the full audit was approved at the June meeting

(d) Planning Applications:

Details of four applications had been received from Shropshire Council's planning department and these were considered and responded to and it was noted that the application for development at Sleap Airfield had been approved.

"Myddle" or "Middle"?

Between the years 1021 and 1242 the village was called variously, "Muthla"; "Mulleht"; "Mhutle" and "Mudle" – see Exwall's Oxford Dictionary of English Place Names. By 1800 it had become "Middle", but as there was frequent confusion with "Middletown", a village on the near-by Welsh border, the Rev. Preb. G H Egerton, who was Rector of Myddle for fifty-eight years, proposed the spelling of "Myddle" which has been used since around 1878.

Mvddle has been spelt with a v in the past; Richard Gough's History of Myddle was written in 1701-2 and he spelt the name with a "y". The Revd. G H Egerton, who was Rector from 1847 to his death in 1905, referred to his own campaign to change the spelling when he gave a paper on the history of the village to the Shropshire Archaeological Society in 1895. The "i" spelling, he felt, caused confusion because people unfamiliar with the district tended to think that his address. "Middle Rectory, Shrewsbury", referred to a Rectory somewhere in Shrewsbury.

Nothing seems to have come of this suggestion until his successor, the Revd. Spencer Woolward, put forward a proposal at the Parish Council meeting on 15th August 1907. Resolution 230 stated: "Upon the motion of the Revd. S A Woolward,

seconded by Mr Green, it was resolved that steps be taken to have the spelling of Middle adopted to its original spelling of Myddle". The clerk must have been kept busy writing to all the official bodies to notify them of the change. In October 1907 he was writing to the Guardians of the Ellesmere Union (the local workhouse) and Salop County Council took action as in December 1907 the Rector reported that "Myddle" had been adopted by the Board of Education and the Local Education Authority.

The Shrewsbury Chronicle of 15 November 1907, under the heading "Myddle not Middle" reported on the name change with the additional

announcement that the Postmaster General had authorised Myddle as the new postmark and also the telegraphic address for the recently opened telegraphic office. Old habits die hard however; the 1929 Kelly's Directory of Shropshire still listed the village as "Myddle or Middle".

Eagle Farm Close

When we were purchasing our house in Myddle the name of the close in the documents was originally Red Castle Close. However, the Parish Council in their wisdom had it changed to Eagle Farm Close. This piqued my interest and little did I know it would lead to links to a Welsh Prince, an illegitimate king's daughter and the Battle of Shrewsbury.

Were there ever eagles in Myddle? This may not be as silly as it sounds. I was involved, in a minor way, with a dig at a Norman Hunting Lodge in the Vale of Glamorgan. There they found the wing of an eagle. It was thought that they had killed the eagle and had taken the wing with them to use the feathers to fletch their arrows. Sea Eagles have recently been reintroduced to England on the Isle of Wight and they have ranged far and wide. In one instance as far as Germany, so their presence in ancient times would be far more common.

On enquiry, I was encouraged to read Gough's History of Myddle and there at the beginning was a map showing the Eagle Farm. Whether the map was part of the original book or added by the publishers I do not know, but subsequently Gough gives a full account.

Thomas Jukes kept an Inn at Myddle and put up a sign of the Eagle and Child. It was common for inns at that time to associate themselves with the nobility of the region. The Le Strange family, being the previous owners of Myddle and Knockin, had come over with William the Conqueror. The family foundation story was that the original Le Strange or "Strang" was found in an eagle's nest. Thus, the family took an Eagle and Child in swaddling clothes as their coat of arms. Gough further states that the first grant of deeds seen by him were all from "Johannes Le Strang Dominus Myddle".

In days gone by, in the absence of post codes and house numbers, a sign or other visual image was an aid to easily identify a property or place. Thus the farm next to the Eagle and Child eventually became shortened to Eagle Farm.

Evidence of its presence continues to this day. Pieces of clay pipe stems turn up in the topsoil along with various pottery and china. Willow pattern china is present having become popular from the 18th century onwards. Clay pipes were most popular between 1600 to 1700 AD, at the time Richard Gough was writing his history. I also found a gold ring, which once held ten

stones, but those are now gone. Originally, I thought it was a cheap piece of costume jewellery, but when I later cleaned it, I could see some sort of hallmark on the inside. Not wishing to be prosecuted, although I think it is of recent date, I emailed the finds officer for Shropshire to see if they were interested. I never received a reply, but Eagle Farm Close continues to this day to be a reminder of the history of Myddle.

What about the Welsh Prince, the king's illegitimate daughter and the Battle of Shrewsbury, that can be a story for another day, if you are interested?

The Lych Gate

On looking through old copies of the Myddle and Hadnall Parish Magazine dated June August 1898, we discovered some interesting articles about the commissioning and building of the Lych Gate. There will be a third article in the next Messenger.

The Lych Gate.

The Subscribers to the Rector's Jubilee may possibly be wondering why there is no appearance as yet of the Lych Gate, which was to form part of the Memorial, and for which the money is provided. The fault rests entirely with the Contractor, Mr. Price, of Shrewsbury, who has delayed beginning the work under the plea of inability to find any old oak suitable for the purpose. The Committee however, who have been greatly annoyed by the delay, have now taken the matter vigorously in hand, and have bound Mr. Price (under a heavy penalty) to complete the work before the end of July.

The Lych-Gate.

An addition has just been made to the Lych-Gate, which the Parish so generously erected in commemoration of the Rector's Jubilee, which not only adds to the beauty of the structure, but also prevents a possible misunderstanding.

The Figure of St. Peter, to whom our Church is dedicated, has hitherto stood over the words, "I am the Resurrection and the Life," whereas no Figure but that of our Lord himself should occupy that position. The figure of St. Peter has therefore been removed to the corresponding niche at the other end of the structure, and a Figure of the Risen Saviour has been placed in the niche over the Text. The Figure was designed, and has been beautifully executed by Miss Morris, of Ellesmere. The alteration, which has the hearty approval of the Bishop, to whom it was mentioned when at Myddle, has been carried out by the Rector as a grateful Memorial of his recovery from severe illness last year.
