GOUGH WALK 3

MYDDLE, SHROPSHIRE



Gough Walk 3. This leaflet describes Gough Walk 3 in detail. Turn by turn and stile by stile. The walk is all on official Rights of Way and has Gough Walk 3 signs and Blue Bridleway signs or Yellow footpath signs for you to follow. On the back of this leaflet is a link to a short video showing each stage of the walk. Please note parts of the walk can be very wet, especially in winter time.

Detailed description of Gough Walk 3 in 2020.

You can park in the station car park, currently free parking. From the station car park at Yorton turn left go under the railway bridge and turn left at the Jubilee Tree.

Now walk along a quiet country lane for 1 kilometre, speeded up for this video. Remember the Highway code and always walk on the right hand side of the road facing the oncoming traffic

Pass Saint Mary's Church Broughton on your right. This church was built in 1858.

Just after the Yorton Heath road sign turn left and

Continue along the quiet country lane for 550 metres until you reach the lane on your right that says no vehicles except for access.

Turn right and walk along this unmade road until you reach the junction with Godings Lane.

Turn left towards Harmer Hill along another quiet country lane. Walk for 800 metres.

As you get towards Harmer Hill you will reach the main road going from Shrewsbury to Wem. Turn right and follow the road towards Wem for about 325 metres just before the cottages cross back over the road. when you reach on your left a 5 bar gate into a field next to a stile with Gough signs. Go over the stile and follow the path.

You will reach the Methodist Chapel on your left and Harmer Hill Village Hall on your right. Go out on to the pavement running next to the busy A528 Shrewsbury to Ellesmere road. Follow the narrow pavement for 299 metres, where it ends turn right into Newton Lane. Walk along the lane for 250 metres until you reach the first house. Opposite the first house there is a green lane to your right.

Follow the track into a small wood keeping the pond on your right. Walking more or less straight on pass through the fields and cross the bridge over the ditch. Continue to the busy main road. Carefully cross the road and turn left and walking on the right hand side of the road proceed some 100 metres up the slope of the main road.

Take the stile on the right and follow a path down through the fields to Yorton. When you reach the first gate do not go though it but turn left keeping the hedge on your right side.

You will reach a stile on your right, pass over it and immediately turn left. Walking down the hill pass through another small gate and keep the hedge on your left. Aiming for the left hand corner of the field carry on down the hill to another small gate and pass between the houses out on to the road. Turn right and you can see the Jubilee Tree 50 metres to your right and the railway bridge where you started from. Go under the bridge and turn right back to the railway station car park.

You will have walked approximately 6.8 Kilometres or 4.25 miles.
